NEWS FROM WORLINGWORTH CEVC PRIMARY SCHOOL



Clopen At the time of writing this, we are still awaiting the Government's announcement on whether and how schools will re-open so we will start this term with children continuing to access their learning online at home via live lessons and set assignments with our key-worker, vulnerable and nursery children learning in school. We very much hope that we will be able to welcome back all our pupils soon and we can come together again fully as a school community. Teachers and staff have very much missed having the children in school and teaching them face to face, however noisier this may be!

However, we continue to plan opportunities to enrich our curriculum this month to support our whole school topic of Distant Discoveries and to keep our children learning at home fresh, engaged and excited :

Pirate Book Week To celebrate World Book Day on March 4th, we will be delivering a cross-curricular week of Zoom live sessions and lesson activities linked to stories, poems, jokes and books all about Pirates. The week will begin with the children having a day in which they learn how to be a pirate and then each day there will be a special Story Time zoom to listen to and share some excellent sea-faring pirate tales. A Treasure Hunt challenge will be set for our budding pirates to complete around the village – so watch out for the book-themed clues as you go for a walk! On World Book Day itself, the children will have live Writing Workshops, a Draw- Along, and Book Time to attend which will be led by some rather familiar Worly pirates. The children can dress up too if they wish and will be given their digital book voucher to spend on a new book. To finish the week, we will share some of the Pirate Stories and Books the children will have created and announce the winners of the Treasure Hunt Challenge and most importantly, give them clues as to where they can find their prize!

RE Day The children will spend the day learning about Hinduism and the Hindu Festival of Holi, exploring the routines and rituals of this occasion, the importance of it for Hindus and how it supports their beliefs and faith.

Easter Discovery Day What is Easter? Why do Christians celebrate it? This year it has been difficult to plan any Easter events but we will spend a special day learning interactively about the events of the Easter Story and reflecting on it and considering the significance for Christians around the world. We will write some Easter prayers for our Reflective garden and include some opportunities for the children to enjoy making some traditional Easter decorations and treats to enjoy with their families.

Comic Relief We all need some extra opportunities to laugh and smile at the moment and so the children will be participating in a day of learning about the work of the charity and taking part in some hilarious fund-raising events for Comic Relief.

School Garden DonationsAs we slowly start to head towards Spring with warmer weather and lighter days, our teachers and pupils are planning their jobs and planting in the school garden this year. We are in need of some seeds and compost for our raised beds and greenhouse. So, if you have any spare vegetable or flower seeds, or seed potatoes that you do not need we would be happy to make good use of them! Bags of unopened compost or manure would also be gratefully received. Please contact Mrs Lawrence in the school office if you can help.

The St. Nicholas Pew Sheet a message from Chrissie

Dear Friends,

Well, here we are in Lent once again. The time of year when we are meant to give things up like chocolate and wine! Really? We may often wonder why our past Lents, so full of good resolutions and pious practices, seem to have borne so little fruit. One reason might be because we have not realised what they were telling us and used them!

Some folk are joining the Benefice wide Lent course which this year focuses upon St. Benedict at Lent. Now, how many folks know that there was a Benedictine priory at Eye which was founded in the time of William the Conqueror and had links with Bedfield? According to the records, the churches of Badingham, Burgh, Bedfield, Brundish, Laxfield, Stradbroke and many others provided tithes. Then there was the Benedictine Abbey at Bury St. Edmunds which like many others, was dissolved in 1539 and this had links with St. Peter's in Monk Soham and St. Mary's in Worlingworth.

Christian life is a thing of ups and downs and Lent is given to us, says Bede Frost, '...not as a disagreeable medicine, though we may need that, but rather as a reviving and strengthening tonic... by which our whole nature may become more ordered and better fitted to walk worthy of the life to which we are called.'

So what are you hoping for during Lent 2021?

It does not seem possible that it is almost a year since the first Lockdown began. How saddened was I that we had to cancel the Mothering Sunday service. You may have seen a notice on the WhatsApp group, 'Community at St. Nicholas' and we will have such a service on 14th March at 10 a.m. and further details will be sent out nearer the time.

There is to be a service of Holy Communion on Easter Sunday at 9.30 a.m. which will be led by Reverend Rebecca Artiss and I will be assisting.

How else might you like the church to be opened up, perhaps for private prayer? Obviously, all must continue to be within the restrictions imposed by COVID-19 and the relevant regulations. At the current time, weddings cannot be held in church unless for exceptional circumstances. Then we have the time later in the year when most if not all will have been vaccinated and we can be together once again! I am wondering how we might fit all of this in with our Harvest Festival? Letter from David Burrell

March 2021

Why are eggs associated with Easter? Why are they such a powerful symbol of resurrection? The word needs some care. It is not resuscitation, as if Jesus were simply brought back to life, like Lazarus or the widow's son at Nam. Resurrection is transformation. So then, why eggs and Easter? An egg is totally changed. What is yellow and white liquid becomes alive with feathers and a chirp. A liquid goo becomes a chicken – a sea gull, crow or magpie. Another Easter symbol is the seed, or acorn. You can look at a seed and never imagine what colour it may turn out to have. Similarly with a caterpillar and butterfly. These are resurrection symbols because they become something else, totally unforeseen and beautiful. And yet there is continuity: the egg becomes a chicken; an acorn becomes an oak-tree; a caterpillar becomes a butterfly.

The resurrection is an invitation to look around to see transformation, to see what is evil being changed, what is immature becoming adult; what appears inert like an egg or seed sprouting life.

Jesus "was raised on the third day." Who raised him? The Father by the power of the Holy Spirit. When we look at the resurrection appearances we associates or disciples. The Risen Jesus is then the same but different. This can be put in another way by saying that Jesus is not resuscitated, but is resurrected. Christ is risen, and has promised to take us with him. This life is not the end; we too will be transformed in endless life and beauty. Human life is good, but it will end. The resurrection gives hope and meaning to our existence, *what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonour, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body* (1Corinthians 15:42-44).

Happy Easter enjoy your eggs.

Libraries are now open again for “Select and Collect” service and reservations so that people can request and pick up items from their library. Please note that the library will close at 6pm on Wednesdays until further notice, during the winter.

There will be no rush to bring items back as loan periods will again be extended and charges suspended. Browsing inside libraries and the use of computers will remain unavailable for the time being. The mobile library services and home library service will also remain suspended for now. As always our plans are dependent on any changes in infection rates or government guidance.

At Debenham the garden outside the library has been receiving attention, and we have planted primulas in the letters SRH cut in the grass beside the drive. We hope they will still be there when you visit, despite the snow and cold!

Book ahead to use a computer: phone or email the library; or just turn up. Printing, faxing and photocopying are also available. We have reintroduced charges for overdue items. This will only apply to items borrowed on or after Monday 5 October which are due back on 2 November onwards. Library loan periods will remain at four weeks.

We have also reintroduced charges for DVDs.

Content from Dr Dan Poulter MP 01 February 2021

Having been contacted by a number of parents and schools concerned about the disparity of higher needs education funding here in Suffolk compared to our neighbouring counties, I have urged the Education Secretary to urgently review Suffolk's funding allocation and to level up education funding for our children and young people.

I share the concerns of parents and schools and I am growing increasingly concerned that without a meaningful injection of cash, many of Suffolk's children risk losing out on their fair share. We already know that Suffolk is facing a substantial increase in the number of children and young people in need of additional support, yet rates for special school places in the county are significantly below those of our neighbours.

Suffolk children and Suffolk schools deserve better and at the very least, a level playing field. The current funding allocation is not right and nor is it fair and this is why I have written to the Secretary of State setting out the case for Suffolk and requesting that his Department levels up Suffolk's SEND funding to secure a fairer future for our brilliant children and young people.

Although our schools currently remain closed under the current restrictions, I have been heartened to hear of the innovative examples of home learning, both from parents and our teachers. That said, home learning cannot take the place of being in class for face to face teaching and I remain hopeful that our schools can begin to return in early March. Ahead of our schools returning, the Government continues to make great progress with the vaccination programme and I am continuing to press the case with the Vaccination Minister and local health leaders to make sure that Suffolk residents are invited to receive their vaccine just as soon as is practicably possible.

As more and more of us receive the vaccine, light is very definitely at the end of the tunnel with many millions of people having been vaccinated across the country. This is a fantastic achievement and my thanks go to all who have been involved in co-ordinating the herculean effort of rolling out the vaccination programme.

We still have some way to go and cannot rest on our laurels, so it remains vital that we all continue to play our part in helping to stop the spread of COVID. We mustn't drop our guard now when we have come so far and the end goal is in sight. The single most important action we can all take is to follow the guidance to stay at home, protect the NHS and save lives.

We are all excited about our return to school on 8th March to see our wonderful children and for them to see friends and for the adults in school to get back into their normal routines. The teachers, parents and children have worked so hard this half term and we appreciate all the efforts families have gone through to ensure their children have been able to access 'school'. We have taught many of our lessons as live sessions and it has been wonderful to see the children's faces but it's much more fun when we're all in class together!

This half term **Class 1** have been investigating the history of pirates and learning about compass points. Our new topic is called 'How Are You?' and the children will be learning about keeping healthy body and minds, some anatomy as well as learning about the history of nursing,



referencing Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. It will be a great opportunity for the children to appreciate all the wonderful work modern day nurses carry out especially in these times of Covid. In our first week back, we will be dressing up as doctors and nurses and roleplaying in a field hospital which will be set up in the back playground.



KS2 will be continuing with their investigations of a Caribbean country compared to the UK and are linking this to books such as 'Tales From the Caribbean' by Trish Cooke and 'Tales From the Isle of Spice' by Richardo Keens-Douglas. They will also be looking at the history of the slave trade in relation to the Caribbean.

Thank you to everyone who has continued to collect recycling and especially those who have taken the time to flatten crisp packets as this makes the processing of the recycling much quicker and easier for Mrs Berkley who is currently sorting it all herself as the children are unable to help due to Covid. We hope to be able to reach £500 by the summer which can then be donated to East Anglia's Children's Hospices.

We hope you all enjoy the warmer weather; while we all had fun playing in the snow, we are all looking forward to spending more time outside!


