THE LOYAL WORLINGWORTH VOLUNTEERS

In the spring of 1798, a remarkable episode in Worlingworth's history began with the recruitment of ninety local farmers and tradesmen to form the Loyal Worlingworth Volunteers, an early Home Guard, which would defend Worlingworth and the eight surrounding parishes from the expected French invasion led by Napoleon Bonaparte. Forty-two of these volunteer companies were formed in Suffolk but Worlingworth's company is special because of a unique painting.

Recruitment in April 1798 took place at the Worlingworth Swan and the minutes from the first meeting survive. John Henniker-Major, the future 2nd Lord Henniker, who owned Worlingworth Hall, was appointed the captain and he had his portrait painted in the uniform of the Loyal Worlingworth Volunteers. This portrait was discovered rolled up in a basement at Christ-church Mansion in Ipswich and, because of the efforts of Worlingworth Local History Group, it is now undergoing restoration so that it can be displayed publicly for the first time ever. What you see on the front cover is the canvas awaiting the replacement of its many paint losses, a lengthy and sophisticated process for the conservators to carry out.

Over £25,000 has be raised towards the cost of this restoration project (38K required) but our charitable trust, which is raising funds, would welcome any donations, large or small, which would help us to reach our target soon. Parish Council Elections - Thursday 4th May

Throughout England parish councils work towards improving community well-being and providing better services at a local level. They are the tier of local government below the level of district, borough or unitary council and are the tier of local government closest to the people. Every four years an election is held and volunteers are sought for nomination to the Parish Council. There are specific criteria that you have to meet to become a Councillor, but if you would like to contribute to your local community, please contact the Parish Clerk for more information about this important voluntary role. Nomination papers are available from Thursday 16th March.

Allotments

The Parish Council has recently been approached by a group of parishioners who are seeking the provision of allotments. Under the Small Holding & Allotments Act 1908 we now have a statutory duty to explore how Worlingworth could make such a provision. It may be that there is a plot of suitable land which could be either sold or leased to the Parish Council for such a purpose. Or it is possible there may be other ways in which land could be made available. At this point it would simply be an expression of interest, without prejudice to either party. If you feel you may have a suitable plot of land we would welcome an opportunity to enter into a dialogue to explore the viability of allotment provision within the parish.

New Village Noticeboard

The Parish Council has recently invested in a new noticeboard, which will (or may already by the time you're reading this) be installed outside the Community Centre. Three of the sections will only be accessible by key to enable space to be kept for essential information to be displayed. The fourth section will be freely available for any village organisation to use to advertise events. <u>Please note any business cards or adverts will be removed.</u>

WORLINGWORTH CEVC PRIMARY : New Term, New Topics Our children continue on their historical journey of distant discoveries this term. Nursery and Reception children have come back to school to find some very unusual creatures roaming in their garden area, laying eggs and looking for plants or meat to eat – the dino-saurs have come to Elgar Class! This exciting new topic will provide lots of rich learning experiences for our young-est children and everybody now knows that Mrs Gascoyne-Cecil's favourite dinosaur is a stegosaurus ! In Years 1 and 2, the children's learning will centre around the lives of pirates in the Elizabethan era, building on their learning about the experiences of different modern -day explorers last term. Our historians in Years 3 and 4 are comparing the Iron Age to the Stone Age this term and enjoying bringing to life Ted Hughes ' text The Iron Man through their reading and writing. Finally, in Years 5 and 6 the children continue to discover the Tudor age and will move on this term to learn about the aims and impact of famous and not so famous, Tudor explorers on lives then and now.

TO ALL RESIDENTS OF BEDFIELD VACANCY FOR TRUSTEE

Q. WHAT IS THE BTE?
A. The Bedfield Town Estate. It is a Charity Trust that was set up in 1883 to benefit Bedfield residents.
Q. WHERE DOES THE CHARITY GET ITS MONEY FROM?
A. The Trust owns farmland, sports field and nine allotments which are leased to various individuals and organisations. Other income comes from the interest of its liquid assets.

Q. HOW IS THE MONEY DISTRIBUTED AND TO WHOM?
 A. The Trustees meet to consider the distribution of the funds. The original Trust Deed was set up to enable maintenance and repair of the church, therefore a large proportion of the income is used for that purpose. The remaining amount is distributed for education, and the general benefit of the residents of Bedfield.
 Q.How often do we meet?

Monk Soham

Beryl Lilian Kerry 1932-2023

Beryl was born to Lily and Alfred Chapman and started her life at Gable Cottage, Bedfield. From the age of 4 years old she would walk the mile to Monk Soham Church with her brother Billy in order to attend Sunday School. They would stay to the church service, where their parents would join them. Beryl's mother would then give her a ride home on the back of her bicycle. When Beryl was 6 years old, she had a baby sister called Ellen. They both loved singing and to their delight the rector's wife asked them if they would like to join a choir with 3 other girls. In 1950 for the Carol Service, they introduced the 9 lessons and carols – something Beryl relished.



In the choir they wore lovely scarlet robes with white accessories. Beryl was still wearing the same robe until she was nearly 80 years old. She learnt to ring the bells, joining her father, brother, and cousins. When George VI died, they rang half muffled bells for 1 hour.

She attended Monk Soham School, walking each way until she was 11 years old, then she went to Earl Soham School, where each child was issued with a school bike and cape and leggings as they would cycle in all weathers. (Thunderstorms too!)

Beryl married Peter Kerry on 02/11/1957 at Monk Soham Church and on 1st June two years later they were blessed with a son, Richard. Both Peter and Beryl were proud parents, grandparents & great-grandparents. Beryl moved with Peter from Bedfield to Framlingham, where they lived until Peter's death. Beryl moved to Felix-stowe to be nearer to her family around Christmas time 2018.

Beryl was a special person, who dedicated herself to serving others, seeing the best in them. Her faith was essential to her being and she served in this capacity too. She was a church warden at St Peter's, Monk Soham, from 1973 until 2001, a total of 28 years' service. She nurtured and encouraged others, leading by example and sharing her wisdom, although she probably wouldn't have described it like that, as she was a very modest person.

Her funeral service was held at St Peter's Church, Monk Soham on 16/02/23. She will be greatly missed by all who knew her.
