

If you are reading this you will hopefully be in receipt of the "Worlingworth Welcome Pack" that will give you some idea of what happens within our community, access to public footpaths, and what the village has to offer beyond a place to live, and you will have joined our small but thriving village.

In moving to Worlingworth you may have done your preliminary investigations to find out something of the history of the village, where we are geographically in relation to major services, shops, major roads etc, and what we can offer to you as a new resident.

This welcome pack is designed to hopefully give you some further guidance and detail about what Worlingworth has to offer, its clubs and organisations, businesses etc and more clarity as to what happens within our community that you may wish to use or participate in.

Although small in numbers we are a thriving and active community, with many voluntary organisations, an active and ancient church (thirteenth century), a community centre with playing field and a primary school with nursery, one of only 9 in the whole of Suffolk to achieve an "outstanding" rating from OFSTED for the last two inspections, certainly a jewel in our crown.

At a governance level the village is represented by a Parish Council of nine elected Councillors, all of whom are volunteers, but who represent all those within our village in regard to policy matters - full details available on Welcome to our website » Welcome to Worlingworth (onesuffolk.net) We, along with our Parish Clerk/Financial Officer, are here to serve you. We hold regular and open meetings on the third Wednesday of each month at the Community Centre. You are most welcome to attend and participate within the public forum section at which time you can raise issues that you consider important. You can also follow proceedings as we go through the business of the council, considering items like planning, finance etc, receive reports from our resident tree warden and footpath officers where relevant, so an active and busy schedule but hopefully for the benefit of all within our village.

If you have any concerns, questions or queries please do not hesitate to contact myself as Chair, our Parish Clerk or any of the Councillors (names/email details/phone numbers are displayed on any of the three village notice boards) who will endeavour to help you where possible.

St Mary's Worlingworth, with St Margaret's Southolt, forms one ecclesiastical Parish within the Four Rivers Benefice which is part of the Hartismere and Hoxne Deanery. The Benefice includes Bedfield, Brundish, Cratfield, Laxfield, Monk Soham, Tannington, Wilby and Worlingworth and Southolt.

St Mary's is a beautiful medieval Church, Grade 1 listed, with many interesting features and a well kept churchyard. It is open dawn to dusk. Southolt, formerly a chapel of Ease, is now looked after by a body of Trustees and is still in use for Baptisms, weddings and funerals. Four special services are held there each year.

The Church holds a Flower Festival and Open Gardens. In addition, a variety of musical events are held in the Church. The churches in this area produce and distribute a monthly newsletter to every home in the village. The editor is Val Swallow v.swallow44@btinternet.com.

We have four Parochial Church Council meetings and an Annual Meeting each year.

The Ladies Guild supports the Church with fund raising.

We hope we will have the pleasure of meeting you at one of our services where you will be warmly welcomed.

The Parish Memorial to the men who gave their lives in the two World Wars is situated in the Churchyard.

Our Churchyard is a "haven" in peaceful countryside with spring flowering blooms. It is maintained in a sympathetic manner to provide access to graves and areas for wildlife.

As part of the Mission and Ministry at St Mary's, we aim to continue "outreach" with informal services e.g. Mothering Sunday in the community centre, Rogation Sunday walking service to bless gardens/ crops etc, Harvest in the Community Centre with a Let's Celebrate service and lunch and lastly, in Advent, a Christmas sing together.

High Suffolk Community Bus

Started over 40 years ago, when all local commercial services were withdrawn, it is operated and driven entirely by local volunteers. The bus is intended to service residents mainly of Bedfield, Bedingfield, Kenton, Monk Soham, Southolt, Tannington and Worlingworth.

The bus currently runs to Framlingham (Tuesdays), Diss (Fridays), Stowmarket (three Thursdays each month). In addition, there are two services per month to Bury St Edmunds and Norwich. There are summer services to Felixstowe (once each month in May, June and September) and Southwold (once each in July and August).

Worlingworth Past and Present IN PHOTOGRAPHS Volume Two





A BRIEF HISTORY OF WORLINGWORTH

We can go back to before the Norman Conquest to trace the history of our parish. Aelfric, Bishop of Elmham, was given extensive tracts of land in Suffolk by King Canute and lands in Worlingworth formed part of this



'gift'. Subsequently, the advowson (the preferment for a priest) of the church belonged to the Abbey of St Edmundsbury until the Reformation. In pre-Reformation medieval times, much of Worlingworth's acres were in the form of "strips" of

land, perhaps only a few metres wide, worked by the peasants for their feudal lord. The present church was gradually built over a period of many years, the present chancel replacing an older church, probably of wood and wattle, between 1280 and 1310. The nave and western tower were added in the 1400s.

When the monasteries were dissolved by Henry VIII, the advowson of Worlingworth Church was sold to Anthony Rous of Dennington. The Rous (Rowse) family were feudal lords of the manor in the parish for hundreds of years until the 17th century. By the late 18th century, the Major and

Henniker families had become the dominant landowners although the Ray family was influential in the commercial Shop Street cluster, centred around the Red House and the Worlingworth Maltings. The Ray family also managed a



shop which traded in spirits, drapery, butter and fine goods. This building is now called the School House.

Worlingworth was a typical Suffolk parish of the 19th century, its inhabitants suffering greatly from the depression in agriculture. Bankruptcies,

suicides, migration, emigration and transportation all featured intermittently

in the parish timeline. In the Government census of 1851, 25% of the parish adult population were classed as paupers. Many cottages were little better than hovels. Consumption and other diseases were a constant danger, even in a rural setting.



The saving grace for many was the

parish church, the community centre of its time. In a religious survey of 1851, it was recorded that there were morning and afternoon services and that, on average, over 300 people attended divine service on a Sunday afternoon. However, the church had become dilapidated and it wasn't until the Rev'd Frederic French had settled in as Rector in the late 1850s, that the




parish's fortunes saw an upturn. The church restoration of 1866-7 and the introduction of the communal "Harvest Home" celebrations were examples of the Rector's determination to improve the living standards of the cottagers. Frederic French served the community as Rector, Manager of the New School, Jus-

tice of the Peace and County Councillor for many years, until his death in 1907.

Over a hundred years later, life in our parish is far, far removed from those halcyon days. Apart from the church, only a few other vestiges of "times past" remain, hidden behind the veneer of modernity.

Worlingworth has many interesting adventurous stories to tell; the boy who was given 5 shillings by the parish and sailed to Singapore in the 1830s, a child born on Fingal Street who joined the Mormons and emigrated to Salt Lake City; the village shopkeeper who supplied the Duke of York's army with beer and made his fortune in Woodbridge and the knighted Rector's son who handled the security arrangements for the 1911 Delhi Durbar. All were sons of Worlingworth in our so-called quiet parish.
